Ms. Quick's Graphic Design students are using technology to learn new skills. So far this semester they each finished a digital self portrait using Adobe Illustrator and digital drawing tablets. The portrait was created piece-by piece after studying the anatomy of the eyes, nose, mouth and learning to blend skin tones together.





Ms. Quick also teaches a screen printing class. Students work on projects that are ordered from clubs and groups around FHS. They learn a variety of skills ranging from design to production and have a lot of fun creating and completing the projects.
