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FUSD Counselors Win Awards Over the Summer

Congratulations to Mount Elden and Sinagua Middle Schools' Students and Counselors!

This summer FUSD was recognized as one of six school districts in Arizona with the "Early College and Career Awareness" designation.

Linda Jensen, Director of AzCAN, stated that FUSD "has taken extra steps to prepare their counselors and other college access professionals. They have shown a commitment for helping middle school students prepare for college and careers. This commitment includes having at least three of their educators complete twenty hours of College Access Professionals (CAP) Training on College and Career Advising in the Middle Grades."

Jensen explained that the educators work to create a college culture, "Their training includes coursework on developing a college-going culture, career planning, academic planning and transitions, and engaging middle school students. This early focus on college and career planning ensures students develop aspirations for their future and make decisions that lead to their post-secondary goals."



Congratulations Once Again to the Flagstaff High School Counseling Staff

Flagstaff High School was named the Naviance College and Career Readiness winner in the 2016 Hobsons Education Advances Awards.

Hobsons' Education Advances Awards program is designed to recognize the innovation that is possible when a school combines people, process, and technology to make a difference in the lives of students.

Flagstaff High School has been using the Naviance system for 10 years school wide.

Naviance is a comprehensive website that you can use to help in making decisions about courses, colleges, and careers.

Naviance is linked with the Counselor's Office, and is a service that is used in the office to track and analyze data about a students' college and career plans and provides up-to-date information that is specific to each school. It also lets the counselors share information with parents and students about up-coming meetings and events, local scholarship opportunities, and other Web resources for college and



career information.

Family Connection will allows the student and their family to:

*Get involved in the planning and advising process – Build a resume, complete on-line surveys, and manage timelines and deadlines for making decisions about colleges and careers

*Research colleges – Compare GPA, standardized test scores, and other statistics to actual historical data from our school for students who have applied and been admitted in the past

*Sign up for college visits — Find out which colleges are visiting our school and sign up to attend those sessions

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Ready for Kindergarten

KinderCamp is a 20-day targeted intervention school-readiness summer program designed to help children with little or no preschool experience, as well as those with other qualifying criteria such as a home language other than English or the level of educational experience in the home, prepare for kindergarten. The program is a partnership between the United Way of Northern Arizona (UWNA), Arizona Community Foundation of Flagstaff and FUSD and several other districts in North-KinderCamp helps ern Arizona. children develop skills in the areas of literacy, social-emotional and cognitive development while supporting the successful transition of the entire family into kindergarten.

KinderCamp®, established in 2005 provides opportunities for children to learn in a rich, stable, growth-producing environment that encourages and respects diversity and individuality. This program engages families in their children's formal education through events such as Family Orientation Nights and Bridging Over Ceremonies, as well as

through home visits made by teachers where parents receive literacy kits and one-on-one attention.

"United Way is honored to have been able to provide this valuable program for 12 years. Our first classes are now in high school and will be graduating; we hope the advantages of participating in Kinder-Camp* has served these fine "young adults" well. We now look to the program's recent, "soon to be kindergartners" to use all they've learned in the program to be successful throughout their educational experience." According to FUSD Educational Enrichment Director, Sylvia Johnson: "KinderCamp is probably the single most impactful activity we can offer families in order to more successfully transition children into their elementary school experience. The growth that young children make in those 20 short days never ceases to amaze me. Children walk away from KinderCamp not only with stronger

academic skills, but most importantly, with more confidence and increased social skills. Fear of going to school is replaced with anticipation and excitement of the new experiences that await them in school."

FUSD just completed its 12th year of KinderCamp, having served just over 2,000 entering kindergarten students in that time. This summer the program served 183 children across three Flagstaff sites. Thank you to all of the teachers, administrators and partners that make this such a successful program.





MEMS Honors Pre-AP Academy Introduces Positive Changes

Mount Elden Middle School's pre-AP team is comprised of; Mr. Craig (Science), Ms. Criley (Language Arts), Ms. Irby (Social Studies), Ms. Petersen (Math 6/7 & 7/8) and Mr. George (Algebra). They are all happy to begin this school year with a growing learning opportunity known as the pre-AP Team referring to the new "team teaching" model being used throughout MEMS. This integrated approach to learning allows all students to experience community rich in various resources while still keeping up on their academic pursuits.

They are excited to integrate all that is great about the accelerated academy with specific focus on:

- Frances Short Pond and the continuation of an important Flagstaff history project. This involves partnerships with a few diverse groups, including using software to help in our citizen science endeavors.
- College campus visits to NAU (6th grade), Arizona State University (7th), and the University of Arizona (8th). Overnight trips in conjunction with these visits are anticipated.
- And this year their work with KidsVoting USA will coincide with the upcoming presidential election.

As always the 6th graders will be visiting Camp Colton.

The team has planned great field trips which in addition to the ones

mentioned above include the Renaissance Festival near Apache Junction. The team works with the Flagstaff Chamber of Commerce, North Country Healthcare and the Arizona Public Service Company in The Skills for Workplace Success program. The Arizona Trail Association supports four field trips, including a working trail-building trip that includes four other partners. They will travel to the Coconino County Superior Courthouse for Law Day USA in May and participate in moot (mock) court.

Chief Manuelito Scholarship Ceremony Honors Six FUSD Graduates.

This scholarship is named after a 19th century Navajo Chief. Chief Manuelito was one of the signers of the treaty that established the Navajo reservation. This year, 120 students received the scholarship, most from Arizona and New Mexico. Six students from the Flagstaff Unified School District were scholarship recipients.

Four of the students attended Flagstaff High School; Kristen Woody, Lauren Slim, Kelsey Williams and Yasmin Zuch. MEMS 6th Grade Science is Hands On

Last year a diverse group of students from Mount Elden Middle School Team 6-1 rotated in three groups of about 20-30 6th graders each week at the Frances Short Pond. Students worked in various roles to research and organize a history of the Pond and the cabin at the Pond. The Museum Youth Curator Experience (MYCE) program initiated by the Arizona Historical Society helped guide the planning process.

Students took down their practice display housed at the Pond's cabin and walked it north up the Flagstaff Urban Trail System and it was displayed at the Pioneers Historical Museum on North Ft. Valley Road.

The community of Flagstaff has been helpful and willing to be involved in this local wetlands science and history project. Involved collaborators include The City of Flagstaff, The Arizona Game and Fish Department, Northern Arizona University (Geology, Biology, the Center for Science Teaching and Learning), Willow Bend Environmental Center, Arizona Historical Society, Coconino Community College, Flagstaff STEM City, local authors, photographers and artists, and MYCE.

FHS Wins Global Near Space Balloon Challenge

Last year's Flagstaff High School Aerospace Engineering students, led by their teacher Bruce Sidlinger, found out this summer that they were awarded 1st Place - Most Educational Initiative - in the 2016 Global Space Balloon Challenge (GSBC)! This year there were 409 teams from 55 countries competing in this challenge. According to the GSBC website their goal is to encourage teams to "collaborate, learn and discover by launching their ideas into space." In the Global Space Balloon Challenge there are no classes by age or grade level, so FHS directly competed with top universities including Dartmouth, MIT, Purdue and Stanford.

According to GSBC officials, "We are proud to be awarding the Flagstaff High School Eagles the first place prize for the most educational initiative for their incredible accomplishments and can't wait to see what they do next."

The launch was an unqualified success. FHS-1 soared to over 100,000 feet and the recovery crew in Winslow found it immediately after its descent under parachute. The stabilized video was amazing and there are now almost two dozen kids that will likely go on to great careers in engineering.
